


As our School Mission indicates we seek to help students become educated individuals, achieve their academic and professional goals and assume responsible roles in a changing world of European cooperation and global interdependence.



Message from Dean of Clinical Education

A notable achievement

Firstly, many congratulations. This is a very special day - the culmination of years of aspiration and effort, and the start of your career as a doctor. As an alumnus of St. George's, I also feel delighted on your behalf. It has been an arduous four years mixed, I hope, with good times along the way to balance the stress of assessments and exams periods. It is a particularly notable achievement for you, as the first cohort to graduate from a new medical school, and you should also be proud of the part you have played in establishing the first Medical School in Cyprus - no mean feat. As the trailblazers for the St. George's programme in Nicosia, you have come up against many additional challenges - as have your teachers and staff. You have had to show persistence, resilience and commitment. These are all qualities that will be needed for the career you are now embarking upon.

A former Dean of St. George's used to refer to our graduates as 'totipotential iatroblasts'. Even if it sounds a little impersonal, it was a term of affection. You may know already what branch or specialty you wish to pursue, but one of the great excitements of qualifying in medicine is the large number of doors that now will open up for you. Some of them may be well into the future, and at this stage you will have no idea of them. Indeed it is not uncommon for doctors to have several mini-careers within a working life in healthcare. Even if you are set on a particular specialty or path, the openings within that - sub-specialisation, education, research, location - are multiple.

At this point, after four years of accumulating knowledge and skills at high speed you are probably approaching the maximum of your knowledge base. However, you are still near the beginning of that long process of gaining the practical wisdom required for



successful and high quality medical practice. Those onerous and numerous DaP assessments you have completed throughout your course are put there with this in mind. We are aiming to instill the good habits of reflection, teamwork and lifelong learning that you will require.

You are now well placed to translate your knowledge towards wisdom. William Cowper, the 18th century poet, made the distinction:

Knowledge is proud that he knows so much Wisdom is humble that he knows not more

You can be proud, rightly, of your achievements in graduating MBBS, but stay humble, eager to learn from your patients and colleagues, and avoid hubris. I wish you good luck and happy times through your lives and careers.
